The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 2014, FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their financial statements in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

The Directors' Report contains the information required to be provided in the Directors' Annual Report under the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) guidelines. The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purpose of charity law and under the company's constitution are known as members of the board of trustees.

In this report the directors of HARP Foundation Ireland Company Limited by Guarantee present a summary of its purpose, governance, activities, achievements and finances for the financial year 2024.

The company is a registered charity and hence the report and results are presented in a form which complies with the requirements of the Companies Act 2014 and, although not obliged to comply with the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland FRS 102, the organisation has implemented its recommendations where relevant in these financial statements.

The company is limited by guarantee not having a share capital.

Principal Activity

The principal activity of the company is to support the continuing evolution of the harp in Ireland, and affirm and promote inclusive, contemporary expression of the c.1000 year old harp tradition.

Financial Review

The results for the financial year are set out on page 14 and additional notes are provided showing income and expenditure in greater detail.

Financial Results

At the end of the financial year the company had gross assets of €69,589 (2023 - €123,652) and gross liabilities of €48,945 (2023 - €66,731). The net assets of the company have decreased by €(36,277).

Financial Position

The directors are satisfied with the overall performance of the Company in the financial year. Overall income increased by €19,351 which is attributable to the increase in Heritage Council Grant, ticket sales and other grants received in the year, However the company's position for the year was a loss of €36,277, this is due to expenditure increasing by €71,694 when comparing to 2023.

The increase in expenditure is primarily attributed to the employment and travel and subsistence costs associated with CÉHI's CEO. Strategic development initiatives were fast tracked to enable the organisation deliver on its strategic vision. The directors are fully confident that such expenditure will further enhance the charity's status in the immediate years to follow.

Additional expenditure were incurred in the year, such as Co - Ordinator fees, rent, utilites and pension benfits, which have all contributed to the increase in expenditure.

In view of the above, the directors still remain optimistic regarding the prospects for the Company. The directors feel the Company is still very well positioned to take advantage of further opportunities for growth.

Reserves Position and Policy

The company is in the process of developing a reserves policy to build and maintain an adequate level of unrestricted reserves / net assets to support the organisation that will be funded with surplus unrestricted operating funds. Reserves will be accumulated to a level which ensures the company's core activities can continue during a period of unforeseen difficulty, for between three to six months. The level of reserves will be kept under annual review by the board

There are no uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

CÉHI's work is funded by An Chomhairle Ealaíon, The Arts Council, Dept of TCAGSM, The Heritage Council, An Chomhairle Oidhreachta and Creative Ireland, Éire Ildánach on a project-by-project basis.

In 2024, we also benefitted from the support of a number of local authority Arts Offices. Our thanks to our other stakeholders: Department of Foreign Affairs, Irish Traditional Music Archive, Scoil Samhraidh Willie Clancy, The Tyrone Guthrie Centre, The Historical Harp Society of Ireland, Cairde na Cruite, Music Network, and Music Generation, TU Dublin, the Royal Irish Academy of Music, University College Cork and University of Limerick. We also wish to acknowledge the support of RTÉ lyric fm.

None of the events listed below would have happened without the support of our core funders. CEHI's mission is to develop and promote harping in Ireland and worldwide. We fulfil our brief through our annual gala and regional concerts, annual lecture, annual north south symposium, harp makers' symposium, journal publications, commissions, podcasts, quarterly newsletters, workshops, young harpers' forum and various collaborative project initiatives with festivals, other harpers, musicians and dancers. We also aim to be a support and resource to the harping community and to create as much access to harping as possible.

2024 was another busy year with a clear strategic focus on consolidating our resources, working with our business development associate to frontload our development agenda and expand our plans to acquire a building/international harp centre for CÉHI. We held a number of preliminary advocacy meetings with key stakeholders throughout 2024 in this regard.

We completed our new strategy Resonance: Bridging Today and Tomorrow and its accompanying business plan Pathway to Resonance. We also undertook a rebranding exercise which we will fully implement in 2025, and which was welcomed by all. We continued to foster strategic relationships with our partners in Northern Ireland around the delivery of Harps Alive|An Chruit Bheo|Harps Leevin. We were very happy to receive funding from the Music Capital Scheme, administered by Music Network for the purchase of two harps in 2024.

These will be used for our many access appearances and workshops. With funding from An Chomhairle Oidhreachta, the Heritage Council, we were thrilled to secure an additional post for the organisation and advertised the Programme Coordinator role which was appointed in May 2024.

For the first time, we employed a professional PR agency to assist in the promotion of Harp Day events countrywide. The team was also joined by a third person in the lead up to Lá na Cruite|Harp Day and they were supported by our design and marketing freelance role. Their efforts have been greatly enhanced by the support and guidance from our Advisory Group members and the unstinting work from board members, who continue to manage finances and governance to maintain our sustainability and to support our work in safeguarding the harping tradition.

We were sorry to announce the departure of our first CEO, Lauren Ní Néill, in December 2024. In the time she was with CÉHI, Lauren greatly enhanced the organisation's operational positioning and professionalisation and brought us on a new trajectory of development. Go raibh rath agus séan uirthi. Notwithstanding that, we were very happy to welcome three new board members to CÉHI in 2024 - Dr Eibhlis Farrell, Tomás Mac Uilleagóid and Dr Éimear O'Connor. They will be a significant asset to the Board.

Key events in 2024

1 Harps Alive!An Chruit Bheo !Harps Leevin

We were particularly happy to receive support once again from the Department of Tourism, Culture, Arts, Sport, Gaeltacht and Media for our cross-border initative Harps Alive|An Chruit Bheo|Harps Leevin festival which we ran for a third year during June/July in Belfast in collaboration with Reclaim the Enlightenment and various other organisations in Ulster. Harps Alive|An Chruit Bheo|Harps Leevin assembled harpers from all over Ireland, performing in Belfast in June and in Drogheda in September 2024 to assess Edward Bunting's legacy, showcase the harpers'

music, and bring a contemporary spotlight to bear on current developments to safeguard harping as a living tradition in Ireland. This was a collaborative project jointly presented by Reclaim the Enlightenment and Cruit Éireann| Harp Ireland. We were responsible for the artistic curation of the overall programme, north and south.

Key organisations contributing to programming, project management, financial management, coordination and the provision of venues across the north included: Reclaim the Enlightenment, Cruit Éireann¦ Harp Ireland, St Joseph's, Sailortown, Turas, Comhaltas Uladh / Conradh na Gaeilge, National Trust, Ulster University, Limavady Area Ancestry, Clifton House, Trasna na Tire, and United Irish Society.

Special thanks also to the National Library of Ireland, Dublin City Libraries, St Peter's Church Drogheda and primary schools north and south who welcomed our harpers for performances.

Representatives from both organisations served as officers on the management committee for the festival. Festival finances were managed and audited with due regard for regulatory requirements of the relevant grant-giving bodies and in the case of CÉHI, the Charities Regulatory Authority and Arts Council of Ireland funding conditions and those of other institutions.

2 Lá na Cruite Harp Day

Lá na Cruite¦Harp Day is a milestone in CÉHI's calendar each year. It took place on Saturday,October 19th and 20th in person and online all over the world. For the eighth year in a row, Irish harpers extended a warm invitation to harpers everywhere to join with them in celebrating our 1000-year-old Irish harping tradition, which is recognised on UNESCO's List of Intangible Cultural Heritage. Our purpose on Lá na Cruite | Harp Day is to promote the harp in Ireland, and internationally among as many performers and to a diversity of audiences, on one day in the year.

Working to the theme of Cothú or Nurture, almost 100 live and online events took place in a variety of spaces and places, where harpers performed and collaborated in a series of harp-led initiatives partnering with other artists and artforms, and delivering an exciting mix of poetry, song and storytelling with other traditional musicians, as they continue to expand the possibilities of the instrument, creating memorable and engaging musical experiences. Our thanks to all our harpers in Ireland and to harpers worldwide who made it such a memorable day.

3 Gala Concert

The Lá na Cruite | Harp Day 2024 celebrations culminated in a memorable performance in the Whyte Hall RIAM featuring Seamus and Caoimhe Úí Fhlatharta, The CÉHI Harp Ensemble led by Fiona Gryson playing the premiere of a special commission from Maeve Gilchrist, Forty Fingers. Maeve also performed in and directed the performance. We also featured a second premiere of a work for harps and voice by Connor Elias Way featuring seannós singer Iarla Ó Lionaird and US harpist, Parker Ramsay - a fitting tribute to Ireland's rich harping tradition, which was funded by a Commission Award from the Arts Council, An Chomhairle Ealaíon.

Other highlights of Lá na Cruite|Harp Day included Harpers' Call, where harpers from all four corners of the globe took the Two Minute Harp Tune Challenge. These videos were released on an interactive map online, with special thanks to Mary Guinan and Stefano Oderico on Lá na Cruite|Harp Day and included more than 150 videos from harpers in Ireland and around the world.

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

HARP Foundation Ireland Company Limited by Guarantee is a company limited by guarantee incorporated in Ireland. The registered office of the company is 26 Herbert Place, Dublin 2, D02 A098 which is also the principal place of business of the company. The financial statements have been presented in Euro (€) which is also the functional currency of the company.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the charity's financial statements.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, modified to include certain items at fair value. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland FRS 102".

The Company has applied the Charities SORP on a voluntary basis as its application is not a requirement of the current regulations for charities registered in the Republic of Ireland. As permitted by the Companies Act 2014, the company has varied the standard formats in that act for the Statement of Financial Activities and the Balance Sheet. Departures from the standard formats, as outlined in the Companies Act 2014, are to comply with the requirements of the Charities SORP and are in compliance with section 4.7, 10.6 and 15.2 of that SORP.

Statement of compliance

The financial statements of the company for the financial year ended 31 December 2024 have been prepared on the going concern basis and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland FRS 102".

Fund accounting

The following are the categories of funds maintained:

Restricted funds

Restricted funds represent income received which can only be used for particular purposes, as specified by the donors. Such purposes are within the overall objectives of the company.

Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds consist of General and Designated funds.

- General funds represent amounts which are expendable at the discretion of the board, in furtherance of the objectives of the company.
- Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that the board has, at its discretion, set aside for particular purposes. These designations have an administrative purpose only, and do not legally restrict the board's discretion to apply the fund.

Income

Income is recognised by inclusion in the Statement of Financial Activities only when the company is legally entitled to the income, performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, the amounts involved can be measured with sufficient reliability and it is probable that the income will be received by the company.

Income from charitable activities

Income from charitable activities include income earned from the supply of services under contractual arrangements and from performance related grants which have conditions that specify the provision of particular services to be provided by the company. Income from government and other co-funders is recognised when the company is legally entitled to the income because it is fulfilling the conditions contained in the related funding agreements. Where a grant is received in advance, its recognition is deferred and included in creditors. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, it is accrued in debtors.

Grants from governments and other co-funders typically include one of the following types of conditions:

- Performance based conditions: whereby the company is contractually entitled to funding only to the extent that the core objectives of the grant agreement are achieved. Where the company is meeting the core

objectives of a grant agreement, it recognises the related expenditure, to the extent that it is reimbursable by the donor, as income.

-Time based conditions: whereby the company is contractually entitled to funding on the condition that it is utilised in a particular period. In these cases the company recognises the income to the extent it is utilised within the period specified in the agreement.

In the absence of such conditions, assuming that receipt is probable and the amount can be reliably measured, grant income is recognised once the company is notified of entitlement.

Grants received towards capital expenditure are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities when received or receivable, whichever is earlier.

Expenditure

Expenditure is analysed between costs of charitable activities and raising funds. The costs of each activity are separately accumulated and disclosed, and analysed according to their major components. Expenditure is recognised when a legal or constructive obligation exists as a result of a past event, a transfer of economic benefits is required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be reliably measured. Support costs are those functions that assist the work of the company but cannot be attributed to one activity. Such costs are allocated to activities in proportion to staff time spent or other suitable measure for each activity.

Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost or at valuation, less accumulated depreciation. The charge to depreciation is calculated to write off the original cost or valuation of tangible fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives as follows:

Computer Equipment

20% Straight line

Debtors

Debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due. Income recognised by the company from government agencies and other co-funders, but not yet received at financial year end, is included in debtors.

Creditors

Trade and other creditors are initially recognised at fair value and thereafter stated at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method, unless the effect of discounting would be immaterial, in which case they are stated at cost.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand comprises cash on deposit at banks requiring less than three months notice of withdrawal.

Taxation

The company has received charitable exemption from the Revenue Commissioners. Accordingly no taxation charge has been included in the financial statements. The company's charitable number is CHY22367.

In line with the stipulations of DPER Circular 13/2014, the charity has obtained and maintained a valid Tax Clearance Certificate for the financial year ended 31 December 2024. This certificate confirms that the charity is compliant with all tax obligations at the time of issuance.

Website Cost

Website Cost costs are valued at cost less accumulated amortisation.

Amortisation is calculated to write off the cost in equal annual instalments over their estimated useful life of 8 years.

3. GOING CONCERN

The board have prepared the financial statements on the going concern basis. In concluding on the appropriateness of preparing the financial statements on a going concern basis, the board has considered the company's ability to secure current and future funding from third parties. The board will curtail costs in line with funding received at all times.

Arts Council funding has been secured for 2025 and the board are confident that further funding can be secured from other sources.

Taking account of all facts as outlined above, the directors consider it appropriate that the financial statements be prepared on a going concern basis.

4. PROVISIONS AVAILABLE FOR AUDITS OF SMALL ENTITIES

In common with many other charitable companies of our size and nature, we use our auditors to assist with the preparation of the financial statements.
